

A nationally recognized leader in the pharmacist reimbursement model, with a thirty-year record in pioneering and embedding clinical pharmacists in medical group practices, Dr. Larry Georgopoulos ('09) came to the college as our associate dean for clinical initiatives and immediately began the intensive work required to build our medication therapy management program.

# PRACTICE READY

### **Student Assessment & Entrustable Professional Activities**

rguably the primary goal of any pharmacy school is to produce competent, practice-ready pharmacists. But how do we assess if a graduate pharmacist is "practice ready?"

Some would say that performance on advanced professional practice experiences (APPEs or clinical rotations) is a good measure of practice readiness. But then what are we really measuring?

This leads us to entrustable professional activities (EPAs), which are one of the hottest topics in pharmacy education. As the name suggests, EPAs are unique duties entrusted upon a specific profession.

The 2016 Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education (ACPE) Standards focus on competency-based strategies as key elements of a Doctor of Pharmacy program and 15 core EPAs have accordingly been developed (Haines ST et al, Am J Pharm Ed 2017;81(1):Article S2):

- Collect information to identify a patient's medication-related problems and health-related needs.
- 2. Analyze information to determine the effects of medication therapy, identify medication-related problems, and prioritize healthrelated needs.
- 3. Establish patient-centered goals and create a care plan for a patient in collaboration with the patient, caregiver(s), and other health professionals that is evidence-based and costeffective.
- Implement a care plan in collaboration with the patient, caregiver(s), and health professionals.

- 5. Follow-up and monitor a care plan.
- 6. collaborate as a member of an interprofessional team.
- Identify patients at risk for prevalent diseases in a population.
- 8. Minimize adverse drug events and medication errors.
- 9. Maximize the appropriate use of medication in a population.
- 10. Ensure that patients have been immunized against vaccine-preventable diseases.

- Educate patients and professional colleagues regarding the appropriate use of medications.
- 12. Use evidence-based information to advance patient care.
- 13. Oversee the pharmacy operations for an assigned work shift.
- 14. Fulfill a medication order.
- 15. Create a written plan for continuous professional development.

EPAs can (and should) be broken down into specific actions that are measurable and appropriate for the level of the student.

For example, a first-year student cannot reasonably be expected to develop an appropriate therapeutic plan for a patient with diabetes, hypertension, and chronic kidney disease, communicate that plan to a health care team, and provide appropriate patient counseling.

However, that first-year student can learn how to review a health record, prioritize healthrelated problems, and develop basic patient counseling skills.

Then as a second-year student, he/she can learn the appropriate pharmacotherapy of these conditions.

As a third-and fourth-year student, he/she would then be placed into scenarios that integrate all of this knowledge while introducing elements of interprofessional collaboration.

This process would ideally move each student from a low to high level of entrustment with regards to each of the aforementioned tasks.

EPAs rely on ongoing and repeated assessment of student competence, thereby allowing for focused teaching and building of confidence in both the learner and instructor.

Look for the COP to use EPAs as foundations for assessment in the near future.

### INNOVATION ROUNDUP news from our office of research

#### **Exploring Student Evaluations by Standardized Patients**

Dr. **Jim Nawarskas**, associate professor within the department of pharmacy practice and administrative sciences, is leading a team of College researchers and UNM School of Medicine collaborators to study the utility of using standardized patients as evaluators of communication skills in student pharmacists.

Dr. Nawarskas and team also hope to determine the extent of the difference in standardized patient assessment of communication skills between pharmacy and medical students. This knowledge will design and assess interprofessional education activities involving standardized patients.

The project was one of only ten projects in the nation to be awarded a one-year grant from the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy.

The UNM College of Pharmacy team also includes pharmacy practice faculty members, Drs. **Patty Marshik**, **Krista Salazar**, **Alex Sible**, **Mikiko Takeda** and **Mary Vilay** are involved with the project. UNM School of Medicine collaborators include **Drs. Edward Fancovic** and **Ann Morrison**, and **Audrey Ortega**.

#### **Timmins Diagnostic Patent Awarded**

Inventor and department of pharmaceutical sciences faculty member, Dr. **Graham Timmins** along with colleague Dr. **Pete Louis A. Silks** were issued patent no. 10,000,787 for their invention "Methods for Diagnosing Bacterial Infections".

Issued on June 19, 2018, the patent covers the technology, which is a breath test for the presence of the bacterium *Clostridium difficile*, detecting bacterial load and response to therapy.

### Among the Best in the U.S.

e continue our stellar progress in national research rankings. According to the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy (AACP) our research enterprise is now ranked 13th in the nation for research funding from the National Institutes of Health. AACP measures annually extramural research funds received by roughly 130 U.S. pharmacy schools. With more than \$11.2 million in total research funding in federal FY17, it's clear that we are continuing on a swift trajectory toward to the top:

- 13th in total federal funding
- 14th in other federal funding
- 21st in overall funding



### 2018 Summer Cycle Research Pilot Project Awards

The UNM College of Pharmacy's research office, research & scholarship committee and Dean Godwin are pleased to announce the 2018 research summer cycle pilot project award winner:

Feasibility of a two-step spray drying process as a taste masking platform: Drs. Linda Felton and Pavan Muttil (\$5,000)

This pilot project award will assist the team's endeavors to develop a novel taste masking approach suitable for a wide range of drugs and readily incorporated into a variety of oral dosage forms for pediatric patients.

Data generated from this project will strengthen the resubmission of an R21 application, and will also support the team's pending patent application.

Congratulations to Drs. Felton and Muttil.

The next pilot project call is expected to be released mid-September and proposals will be due by November 19, 2018.

We encourage resubmission of unfunded proposals from previous cycles.
